DFAC closure

The Bldg. 3223 dining facility near the Maneuver Support Center of Excellence NCO Academy - commonly referred to as Tony's - is closed through the end of January 2024, while improvements are made to the water and electrical systems, the heating, ventilation and air conditioning, and new floor tiles and ceiling are installed, along with new paint. While it's closed, during the week, the Bldg. 630 DFAC, located at 5323 Colorado Ave., will provide support, and a shuttle service will run approximately every 25 minutes between the north side of the parking lot outside Thurman Hall at the MSCoE headquarters building and Bldg. 630, which will be open from 5:30 to 8 a.m. for breakfast, 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. for lunch, and 4 to 6:30 p.m. for dinner. On weekends and holidays, the Bldg. 1792 DFAC – located between Cooley and Oklahoma avenues - will provide support, though there will not be a shuttle service to Bldg. 1792. Hours will be 5:30 to 8 a.m. for breakfast. 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. for lunch, and 4:30 to 7 p.m. for dinner. Call Master Sgt. David Barrera at 573.563.5501 for details.

Teen ID post access policy

Fort Leonard Wood's Directorate of Emergency Services has policies on checking teenager Department of Defense ID cards at installation access points. If a child is with a parent or guardian, then no ID is required unless the child looks close in appearance to an adult or if the child is driving. Additionally, DOD ID card holders under the age of 18 are not authorized to sponsor non-DOD personnel on post. They open the back door, and the vehicle goes out. Right after that, the jumpmaster waives his arms and says, "Follow me," and you step out right after that vehicle. It's a big adrenaline rush and an exhilarating

What is your favorite part about your current position?

What might people be surprised to know about Fort Leonard Wood?

What advice would you give to someone considering a career in the Army?
