Lieutenant Colonel (LTC) John C. Floyd hails from Tampa, Florida. He earned a Bachelor of Arts in Religious Studies and Humanities from the University of South Florida, graduating magna cum laude in 2007. Upon completing his degree, he was commissioned through the Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) as a Distinguished Military Graduate and entered active duty in the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.
