Fort Leonard Wood hosts R2 Fair





MUSEUM SPECIALIST

U.S. ARMY MILITARY POLICE CORPS REGIMENTAL MUSEUM

Responsible for a 7,000-piece collection that has been curated to tell the story of the Military Police Corps.



Where are you from originally?

My father's final assignment was here at Fort Leonard Wood, so I guess I am a local.

What is your favorite part of the job?

Being able to engage with active-duty Soldiers and veterans and seeing them connect with something on display. I tell them that their memories matter and their experiences matter. It is our job to keep those memories alive for them.

Why did you decide the Army was the right place for you?

I am the daughter of two Army veterans and I am who I am today because of my parents. I believe this job is an honor and a blessing. For me, to be able to preserve the stories of these

Soldiers and tell their stories when they are no longer able to — I cannot imagine working anywhere else.

What is your favorite artifact?

Before the rise of the garrison cap and the service cap, Soldiers wore campaign hats — what we would refer today as looking like a drill sergeant's hat. About two years ago, we took in what is called a quartermaster's sample campaign cord. This campaign cord, from 1924, would have been worn on the campaign hat. Basically, at the time, Soldiers wanted others to know their regiment and they didn't necessarily have anything on their uniform that was easily identifiable. By wearing these colored cords on their campaign hats, it was a way to broadcast and show

esprit de corps. This cord is called a quartermaster sample because it is an approved design — color, pattern and shape — then they would put this special wax seal on the back of the tag. This would be sent to the companies that had applied to manufacture insignia for the Army. So, we have this cord, it has the original tag and seal and the seal is a little crumbled. I think it is an important piece because it is the first official artifact we have with the green and gold of the MP Corps.
