AIRFIELD OPERATIONS

When this morning's inclement weather brought potential hazards to the installation, the Directorate of Plans, Training, Mobilization and Security's Aviation Division monitored the situation and prepared to act to ensure Forney Airfield was safe for passengers.

Warrant Officer Basic Leader Course Instructor Chief Warrant Officer 3 Daniel Stanley spent eight years as an enlisted military policeman and with the Criminal Investigation Division before becoming a warrant officer. Today, he teaches the skills he has learned to future warrant officers at the U.S. Army Military Police School.

Where are you from originally?

I'm from Nebo, North Carolina.

Where did you attend initial entry training?

I attended one station unit training at Fort Leonard Wood in 2003.

Why did you choose to become a warrant officer?

I became a warrant officer in 2015, because there were things I wanted to do that, a lot of times, you have to be a warrant officer to do in our organization. I also saw the opportunities available to warrant officers and an opportunity to take care of my family, so I thought it would be a nice next step.

What do you specialize in?

I'm kind of a jack of all trades, master of none, but my degree is in forensic science. That's one of the things that is unique to our organization. Now, I teach, but I used to work crimes like death, murder, sexual assault, larcenies and things like that – that's what CID does.

What keeps you going when working with such tough subject matters?

I think, at the conclusion of the case, when we go into a court martial and see these people who have done bad things get locked up, it motivates us to continue. Also, the agents who work for you, the ones that you work with, and the ones you've worked for, keep us going because it definitely gets to a dark place sometimes.

How do you define leadership?

Leadership is being involved. It's about showing your Soldiers the right thing to do and answering their questions. I've had a wide range of leadership - good, bad and indifferent - so, I think that a lot of it is just being present and taking care of them. If they ask for something, then get it done as quickly as you can.

What is your favorite part about your job?

What I really enjoy is being able to
