Why did you choose to become a DA Civilian?

I enjoy law enforcement and helping people. I'm a veteran – I did the same thing in the U.S. Navy for four years as a master at arms. Being a police officer in the Navy, and now a DA Civilian police officer, I just kind of married the two together, and the draw to be here and protect this area where I grew up just kind of formed me into the person I am.

What's your favorite part about being a DA Civilian here?

It doesn't feel like work sometimes, because being outdoors is who I am. I grew up recreating in these woods – floating and fishing on the Big Piney River. That's what formed my opinions and my strong interest in nature. That interest led me to go to college and get a degree in biology, so I have a strong tie to the environment of Fort Leonard Wood and a desire to protect it.

What are some of the benefits to being a DA Civilian?

There are many. **Obviously, there's the pride you get from serving your country and helping to continue the mission here at Fort Leonard Wood.** There's the retirement, and the compensation is good, too. Also, the training opportunities you get as a DA Civilian not only broadens your skillset; it can help you figure something else out you'd like to do as well.

What advice do you have for those interested in becoming a DA Civilian?

That initial screening on your resume is very important. If you have those skills, or those requirements, make sure they are in your resume, because if not, you're not making it past that first hurdle. **Keep trying, be persistent and be flexible** – you might not be able to get exactly what you want right out of the gate.
