Holiday hourly child care options

Child Youth Services is currently offering holiday hourly care for children ages 3 to 5, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays at Child Development Center 615. Flu shots

Flu shots are now available on post for beneficiaries within the Fort Leonard Wood community. For Tricare beneficiaries, mandated Department of Defense and non-appropriated funds civilians and contractors, and tenant units without organic medical teams (call 573.596.3663 for group scheduling) between the ages of 18 and 64, without a complex medical history, walk-in hours are 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. weekdays at Harper Clinic, Bldg. 500. For beneficiaries between the ages of 6 months and 17 (along with the parents of children being vaccinated) and beneficiaries 65 and older, and beneficiaries with a complex medical history, walk-in hours are 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays at the General Leonard Wood Army Community Hospital Immunizations Clinic. Active-duty service members with a U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command Organic Medical Team should contact their unit operations or TOMS for times and locations. Additionally, a pediatric influenza rodeo is scheduled for 4 to 6 p.m. today at the Immunizations Clinic for Tricare beneficiaries between the ages of 6 months and 17. I have a great sense of pride, knowing these service members have good, quality meals and are being taking care of.

Responsible for monitoring a food service contract that provides 33,000 meals in Army Warrior restaurants each day on Fort Leonard Wood.



Where are you from originally? Waukegan, Illinois

What originally brought you to Fort Leonard Wood?

My husband was active duty when we arrived here, and I was hired here in 2017, but I have been in food service my entire career. I joined the Air Force as a Services Specialist in 1997, and then, I switched to the Army National Guard, where I was a 92G Culinary Specialist.

Would you explain what a contracting officer's representative does?

I make sure the government is receiving everything they are paying for. We have three quality assurance evaluators who work in our department. They go out to the 13 (Army Warrior restaurants) to monitor the contract, and I review their inspections.

What do you like most about your Army career?

I enjoy coming to work every day. We feed about 11,000 service members at each meal, three times a day. We are the second-largest food program in the Army.

What is something you are most proud of in your career?

Thanksgiving. A lot of people don't realize that Thanksgiving on post is like our Super Bowl. We work hard to make sure these service members feel like they have a safe place to belong when they aren't at home. It is amazing to see the work our contractors put into the meals and the care they take to decorate the dining areas. Think about what it takes to cook a special Thanksgiving meal for your family – now, do that for 11,000 service members. It is just amazing to see each year.

What advice do you have for those considering an Army civilian career?

It is the best thing you can do. I have a great sense of pride, knowing these service members have good, quality meals and are being taking care of.
