Location data advertises where you are, where you've been and potentially when you'll return.

To mitigate risk:

turn off precise location settings when not needed for navigation, workouts or other activities, or when taking pictures, especially when on vacation;
refrain from posting information online about your vacation or extended trips away from your residence until you have returned home;

- always examine where a company is based when deciding to purchase a smart device or download an application. Understand the risk factors, and that your data could be stored by whatever country owns that technology.

Individuals should contact the Fort Leonard Wood transportation office when orders are received – any delay in contacting the transportation office may result in non-availability of Department of Defense-contracted moving companies. The installation ice house, in Bldg. 821, makes block and crushed ice for units across Fort Leonard Wood. Initial Entry Training Soldiers bag approximately 350 20-pound bags and 80 8-pound blocks every day.
